We are Medical Students for a Sustainable Future, a national coalition of over 420 medical students across 100+ medical schools, including Rhode Island's Warren Alpert Medical School at Brown University, who recognize that human health is intimately tied to planetary health. Motivated to protect our future patients and the communities we serve and love, we catalyze action to prevent and address the health harms of environmental threats.

We are writing to express our concern about the proposed Sea 3 Liquefied Propane Gas expansion. This fossil fuel infrastructure expansion poses a direct threat to the health of the local community of South Providence and Washington Park, an area that is already known to have some of the highest rates of childhood asthma exacerbations in Rhode Island due to local air pollution. Additional air pollution from fossil fuel operations in an area already overburdened by a high concentration of polluting industries will result in a multitude of adverse health effects, especially due to the proximity of this expansion to neighborhoods, schools, and community health centers. These include chronic respiratory diseases, cardiovascular disease, cancer, and more. The project is also a threat to all of our future patients across the nation: expansions in fossil fuel infrastructure produce greater greenhouse gas emissions and further accelerate climate change, which has been deemed the greatest global health threat of the 21<sup>st</sup> century by the World Health Organization.

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
