SUPPLEMENT OF THE TOWN OF BURRILLVILLE TO ITS MOTION TO DISMISS THE APPLICATION AND CLOSE THE DOCKET

The Town of Burrillville (the "Town"), an intervenor as of right in this docket, and the proposed host community for the Clear River Energy Center, submits this Supplement to its September 13, 2016 Motion requesting that the Energy Facility Siting Board ("EFSB" or "Board) issue an Order dismissing the Application to construct the Clear River Energy Center and closing the docket. The purpose of this supplemental filing is to bring to the attention of the Board a Resolution of the City Council of the City of Providence that was passed yesterday evening, February 2, 2017. A copy of that Resolution is attached hereto as Exhibit A.

The Providence Water Supply Board ("Providence Water") is a department of the City of Providence. Providence Water supplies water to the Town of Johnston on a wholesale basis. The water supply plan submitted on behalf of the Clear River Energy Center on January 11, 2017 states that "[w]ater for use at the Facility will be supplied from the Town of Johnston, Rhode Island under a long term water supply agreement and delivered to the Facility via public roads by trucks " (at 1). The plan also states that "[t]he Town of Johnston purchases its municipal water from the Providence Water supply system, which has its own water reservoirs and water treatment facility." (at 1).

The attached Resolution of the Providence City Council does a number of things.

First, it states that the City Council of the City of Providence "does hereby oppose the siting of the Clear River Energy Center in Burrillville, RI."

Second, it states "BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That, as the democratically elected representatives of the people of Providence, the City Council does not support and hereby expresses serious concern over the use of water from the Providence Water Supply Board for the Clear River Energy Center." The Resolution states that the Providence City Solicitor must "provide the City Council with information and clarification regarding the City's and the Providence Water Supply Board's ability to prevent the use of Providence water at the CREC power plant and legality of the resale and markup of Providence water by Providence Water Supply Board wholesale customers."

Although it is very important that the City of Providence has become the 24th city/town to formally oppose the Clear River Energy Center by passing a city/town Resolution against the Center, for purpose of the Town of Burrillville's Motion to Dismiss, the crucial point in this Resolution is that the Clear River Energy Center water plan may not be viable at all. The plan relies on water to be supplied by Johnston. Johnston obtains its water from Providence Water. However, Providence is seeking "to prevent the use of Providence water at the CREC power plant" and is questioning the "legality of the resale and markup of Providence water by [Johnston]."

Finally, the Providence City Council has flatly stated that it "does not support . . . the use of water from the Providence Water Supply Board for the Clear River Energy Center."

The Clear River Energy Center water plan is wholly dependent on water being supplied by Providence Water Supply Board to the Town of Johnston and then resold to Clear River Energy Center. However, it now appears that proposed arrangement will be subject to legal challenges. The viability of the entire water plan is in serious question.¹

¹ We have also been informed that there are approximately ten pending legal challenges questioning the legality of the water vote by the Johnston Town Council and whether that vote was in violation of the Rhode Island Open Meetings Act.

According to the *Providence Journal* (Exhibit B):

"The new law the council wants passed would amend state law to say that a community which buys water from a municipal supplier 'shall limit the sale of such water to customer located within the municipality'."

Accordingly, the Town of Burrillville requests that its Motion to Dismiss be granted.



RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL

No.

WHEREAS, On October 29, 2015 Invenergy Thermal Development LLC filed an application to Construct the Clear River Energy Center Power Plant (CREC) in Burrillville, RI with the Rhode Island Energy Facility Siting Board (EFSB); and

WHEREAS, In the months since the filing of that application, the Town of Burrillville has conducted extensive study of the application with and through credentialed professionals, including studies of noise, water, traffic and air quality, among others; and

WHEREAS, After considering expert testimony and conducting thorough public hearing the Burrillville Planning Board and Zoning Board of Review have advised the EFSB that Burrillville, RI is not a suitable site for the Clear River Energy Center; and

WHEREAS, The Burrillville Building Inspector and Burrillville Tax Assessor, have also submitted advisory opinions to the EFSB expressing the impact the proposed Clear River Energy Center would have on the Town of Burrillville; and

WHEREAS, Sixteen cities and towns in Rhode Island have passed resolutions opposing the siting of an Invenergy power plant in the Town of Burrillville; and

WHEREAS, According to the Blackstone River Watershed Council, "emissions from the power plant, in particular methane and carbon dioxide, would affect a 30-mile area in the northwest corner of Rhode Island"; and

WHEREAS, Particulate matter would "diminish air quality, local rivers and watersheds would eb stressed, additional deliveries of chemicals by large commercial vehicles would put residents at risk, noise pollution would increase and the biodiversity impacts and loss of wildlife habitats within the shared watershed would harm the regional environment," according to Burrillville Conservation Chairman, Kevin Cleary; and

WHEREAS, The CREC power plant in Burrillville would prevent Rhode Island from meeting the reduction in greenhouse gas emissions set by the 2014 Resilient Rhode Island Act; and

WHEREAS, Invenergy's efforts to obtain the water needed for the power plant met resistance and opposition for many months, with the Pascoag Utility District, the Harrisville Fire District, and the City of Woonsocket rejecting proposals to provide water for the power plant; and

WHEREAS, On January 10th, the Town of Johnston approved a 20-year deal selling Invenergy water for the CREC power plant; and

WHEREAS, The Providence Water Supply Board (PWSB) is the wholesale supplier of water to the Town of Johnston which will be resold to Invenergy; and

WHEREAS, The agreement between the Town of Johnston and Invenergy obligates resources owned by the people of Providence without them having a choice or say in the matter; and

WHEREAS, During the past year, many citizens of the Rhode Island, as well as our neighboring communities in Massachusetts and Connecticut, have expressed strong opposition to the siting of the Clear River Energy Center for reasons including the negative impacts on property, environment, traffic, public health, public safety, and water; and

WHEREAS, The Providence City Council joins with the citizens and officials of the Town of Burrillville as well as residents throughout the State of Rhode expressing concerns and objections to the siting of the Clear River Energy Center in Burrillville, RI.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the City Council of the City of Providence does hereby oppose the siting of the Clear River Energy Center in Burrillville, RI.



Providence City Council votes to oppose water sale for Burrillville power plant

PROVIDENCE, R.I. - The City Council Thursday night unanimously passed a set of resolutions opposing the sale of Providence Water Supply Board water for a proposed power plant in Burrillville and called for legislation that would ban any town receiving city water from selling it to out-of-town customers like the Burrillville plant.

The three resolutions were prompted by Invenergy LLC's proposal to build a 1,000 megawatt, \$700 million power plant that will use between 15,000 and 20,000 gallons of PWSB water a day, bought from Johnston.

Johnston's selling so much water to an out-of-town entity has angered the council. Councilman Kevin Jackson said if the precedent were allowed to stand any town getting water from the city's water system would be free to sell it to any business anywhere at a profit while water board rates are limited by state regulators.

The new law the council wants passed would amend state law to say that a community which buys water from a municipal supplier "shall limit the sale of such water to customer located within the municipalityâ€|"

Councilman Samuel Zurier, who drafted the resolution seeking the legislation, said it was necessary to conserve the water board's supply for the purposes for which it was intended.

The resolution will be forwarded to the city's legislative delegation.

The other resolutions put the council on record as opposing the plant proposal, which is being reviewed by the state Energy Facilities Siting Board, and called on PSWB officials to report to the council "with specificity" on its regulatory structure and operations.

Johnston's agreement with Invenergy calls for the company to pay the prevailing rate for the water it uses and give Johnston more than \$18 million in additional compensation over 20 years. Invenergy will bring the water to Burrillville by truck.

Johnston is allowed up to 150 gallons per person per day from PWSB system, and PWSB General Manager Ricky Caruolo has said the town is well below that limit, leaving it free to sell the 15,000 to 20,000 gallons a day to Invenergy.

In other action, the council gave final passage to an ordinance reorganizing the Board of Licenses. The measure now goes to Mayor Jorge O. Elorza for his signature. The council also referred to its Finance Committee a recommendation that it appropriate no more than \$25,000 to pay for legislative lobbying in the 2017 session.
