I am writing to express my opposition to Invenergy's proposed Clear River Energy Center in Burrillville, RI.

In a state which prides itself in tourism and hospitality, the location of the plant could not have worse: with its' proposed location on the northwest corner of Pulaski/George Washington State Forest, the State of Rhode Island would not only be throwing away a generation of state and local land-use planning, but with it tens of millions dollars invested to preserve and enhance these parks and forests that cater to so many.

Invenergy promises that the Clear River Energy Center will help drive down energy costs in Rhode Island, passing along a savings of over \$200 million dollars in the first four years alone. Testimony provided to the Rhode Island Public Utility Commissions revealed the savings to be between \$0 and \$36 million dollars for the first year, with rate payers' saving a measly 1-2%. The recent ISO-NE Annual Reconfiguration Auction proved that there was no threat to the amount of power in the grid for 2019 by allowing Invenergy to sell its' obligation of 485MW to another power supplier due to its lack of a permit at this time. Again signaling that this plant is not needed in order to meet demand, even with recent closure of Brayton Point.

In a state that already has the highest CO2 emission rate in New England, we cannot afford another power plant. With an additional 3.6M tons of CO2 spewed into the atmosphere per year, Clear River Energy Center would increase CO2 emissions by over 75%! Governor Raimondo is proposing the addition of over 1000MW of renewable alternatives by 2020 that would help lower CO2 emissions and create thousands of clean and green energy jobs. By approving this plant, we would be taking a step *backwards*, not *forwards*.

I stand in opposition of this project along with thirty four other communities in the State of Rhode Island. The facts do not lie: the Clear River Energy Center is not needed or wanted in the Town of Burrillville.
